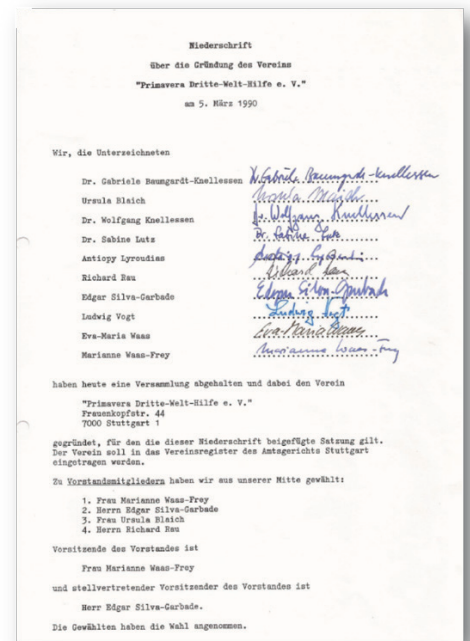
Brazil, in 1971 and renamed Instituto Robert Bosch in 2004) and broaden its orientation.

... my wife and I, as co-founders of Primavera 30 years ago, never even dreamed of the resounding success the initiative "Primavera – Help for Children in Need" would achieve.

For more than half that time I also worked in Brazil and with dedication, and much joy, I have seen the number of projects and the aid provided to children and young people grow over the years. We are currently lending active support to nine projects in Brazil. The emphasis is on school education and vocational training, but we also further medical care and ethical education on responsible and social behavior.

Thanks to the support of many dedicated Bosch associates our aid has also been expanded in other emerg-

ing countries. In the meantime, almost 8,000 children and young people are receiving assistance in the form of school education in 43 projects, and their personal development is being promoted so they can escape the cycle of poverty and find a better place in society.

All projects supported by Primavera are delivering very positive outcomes. An aspect of particular importance is the long-term support of young people. In the Primavera News 'Remarkable life stories' series we always introduce our readers to young people who have been empowered to lead an independent and satisfying life through vocational training or university studies (see Primavera News 1/2020 'Karine' from the CPTI project in Campinas, Brazil).

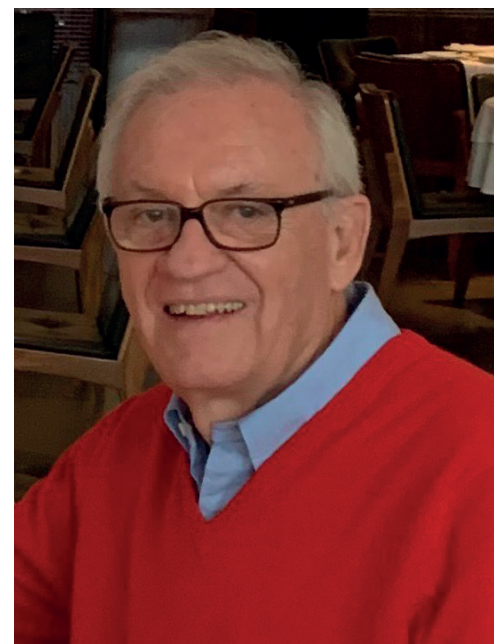

2021 – A CHALLENGING YEAR FOR INDIAN PROJECTS

Aiswarya Trust project,
Chennai, India

Indian projects (NGOs) are facing a major challenge this year – due to new government requirements and changes in regulations that will make it fundamentally more difficult for NGOs to receive foreign donations.

Accordingly, the administrative costs of the NGOs may not exceed 20 percent of total expenditure. In addition, projects have to open a special bank account

with the State Bank of India in Delhi.

Of the original ten NGOs Primavera had regularly supported, only some were able to receive donations from Primavera in 2021.

Thankfully, the NGOs were able to cope with the changed situation, although this was partly because they had to significantly reduce activities on account of the pandemic.

Should the situation improve before the end of 2021, we are ready to step up our financial support at short notice. In addition, we are working intensively with our Bosch colleagues in India so we can return to providing the accustomed financial support again in 2022.

EFFECTIVE HELP IN THE PROJECTS

Aiswarya Trust saves children's lives

Among the number of infant deaths in India due to birth defects, congenital heart defects are the leading cause of mortality.

One can hardly imagine what it must feel like for parents whose child is suddenly diagnosed with a heart defect, but who cannot afford the necessary heart surgery and artificial respiration that would save their life. For us practically inconceivable, in India it is by no means a rare occurrence, unfortunately.

Inspired by friends and in memory of her young daughter, Aiswarya, who died from a congenital heart defect, Ms. Chitra Viswantha founded the Aishwarya Trust in Chennai in 2008. The trust enables the treatment of the children concerned and funds vital operations. Only India's most renowned heart surgeons perform the operations.

"Every child should be entitled to the best possible treatment."

Primavera's annual donations can save at least ten children from certain death by cardiac arrest.

The little boy Sakhivel, 18 months old



Eight days after birth, Manjumalathi's baby son suddenly suffered massive respiratory distress and it quickly became clear that artificial respi-

ration and heart surgery would be needed to save his life. Unfortunately, the family did not have enough money to pay for the operation and the hospital stay, and was helpless in the face of their child's critical and rapidly deteriorating condition. Desperate, the father, a mechanic specialized in two-wheeled vehicles, contacted the Aishwarya Trust in the hope of getting financial assistance. Thanks to the Trust, it was possible to perform the vital surgery in July 2020. After a few days of artificial respiration and feeding, the boy was safely discharged from hospital and continues to be monitored and cared for by the medical team.



PRIMAVERA SUPPORTS EIGHT CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES

Asociación Civil Rafael Arcángel project,
Córdoba, Argentina

In operation since 2017, the center has developed into a sustainable self-help project for severely disabled children, including children with Down's syndrome.

Drawing on anthroposophy and Waldorf education concepts, the center's qualified carers support and encourage the children, while taking into account their age and abilities and catering for their individual needs.

The aim is to give children with physical and mental disabilities time and space to develop their personal skills, thereby strengthening their self-esteem and reinforcing their willpower, in turn empower-



ing them to later integrate in society. A range of therapeutic measures, among them speech therapy and psycho-educational activities, support the children's personal development.

The requisite infrastructure is provided in the form of workrooms, an assembly hall for joint activities, and a kitchen with a dining room in the town of Villa Allende, near Córdoba.

The aid project is supported exclusively by private cash and in-kind donations. Owing to the pandemic, funds are now running low. Ms. Jimena Jarab (PT-BE/SAR-AM1), sales manager responsible for Bosch Power Tools in Argentina, visited the project at the beginning of the year to get a first-hand impression of the location, the children, and the support staff.

She was extremely impressed by the caregivers' dedication and the professionalism with which they take care of the children. She also had the opportunity to speak with some of the children's parents, most of whom were simply unable to adequately support their children due to their low income as well as a lack of support from the state.

After her visit and a telephone conference with, among others, project supervisor Ms. Marion Lechner (C/CGR-LA, Buenos Aires), it was decided to submit an application to



Primavera to obtain support for the project. Primavera's executive committee approved the application, enabling an initial donation in 2021 of six thousand euros.

FROM VISION TO SUSTAINABLE AND SUCCESSFUL EDUCATION PROJECT

Hand to Hand, Pattaya, Thailand

Margaret Grainger from Australia (founder of the Hand to Hand Foundation) had a vision, namely to help children and young people growing up in orphanages or living on the streets and to give them better prospects for life.

It was in 2009, after visits to local prisons where children and young people were also incarcerated, that she decided to get to work by setting up a small pre-school for children living in slums.

Initially, the school was set up in a shed in an industrial park, with no desks or chairs, qualified teachers, or school supplies. But in response to the very high attendance, she quickly started asking for donations. And she was successful! It was soon possible to buy books and stationary.

Yet, from the outset, she felt it important to involve the parents in the support measures for the children and to provide them assistance. Often they had little income to speak of and could only provide their children with the bare necessities. As a result, many of them placed their children in orphanages where they could be better cared for than at home.

Margie refused to accept this. She was intent on doing everything she could to ensure that families could be reunited and live together, and to provide the children with prospects for a better life through education and training. Step by step, the scope of support was extended and refined.

In the meantime, Margie had also found personal supporters at Bosch Southeast Asia, including the director's spouse, Claudia Hayes. Together, they have since supervised projects and coordinated measures.

In 2014, the Thai government officially recognized and registered Hand to Hand (H2H) as an aid organization. Today, in addition to preschool education for children living in slums, H2H also offers scholarships for infants and high school students until they graduate or qualify to go on to university.

Primavera e.V. has been supporting H2H since 2015. As a result, the project is today able to sponsor more than 100 children and young people and support their families. Just one example, Primavera funds travel to school, school uniforms (which are mandatory for attendance), as well as textbooks and meals during school hours.

Another important aspect to bear in mind is that many of the pupils in the project are the first in their families to get a school education, which means that their parents can neither read nor write, and therefore cannot help them with their homework and schooling. H2H has adapted its efforts accordingly and additionally offers homework help on Saturdays as part of a children's club.

Since school attendance is free of charge in Thailand, strict attention is paid to ensure the support goes to students in need and whose families have committed to sending their children to school. Occasionally, it is local social workers or school principals who recommend children and young people in need for participation in the project.

The institution is also in contact with various companies in the Pattaya area to help school leavers and graduates find apprenticeships and trainee positions. Last year, for example, one student completed a training course in social care, graduated with a di-

ploma, and is now doing a two-year internship with H2H. She is familiar with the project's contents and goals, which is very helpful for both sides and benefits their work. Another student has successfully completed her course in forensic medicine, has landed a well-paid job in a renowned Pattaya hospital with the support of H2H, and is now also able to support her extended family in many ways.

In addition to the vital help for children and young people, Primavera has been able to draw on its experience and support H2H's efforts to professionalize its activities, for example with regard to the handling of applications and dealing with authorities. From the very beginning, the organization cooperated closely with Intira Park, the Bosch associate responsible for supervising the project on site.

Margie Grainger has made H2H the organization it is today with her tremendous passion and by taking effective steps to achieve the strategic goal, not to mention the commitment of staff and sponsors.

THE TURBULENT HISTORY OF EIGHT-YEAR-OLD "APPLE"



Hand to Hand, Pattaya, Thailand



Nicknamed “Apple”, Supansa Thara was brought to the aid organization Hand to Hand (H2H) in Pattaya, Thailand, by the country’s social welfare services when she was barely one year old. She was scared, cried a lot, and it took months for her to open up and begin to trust her caregivers at H2H. Fortunately, after some research, the staff managed

This would make her the first person in her family to obtain a high school diploma. Supervised by social services, Apple and her grandparents also regularly participate in H2H’s kids’ club activities. This ensures that Apple’s best interests are always seen to and that the grandparents can get quick support should problems or challenges arise.

Thanks to the commitment of the Hand to Hand aid project, the young girl’s living conditions have changed dramatically, paving the way for a better and sustainable future. We will continue to report on Apple’s progress from time to time.

to track down her grandparents in the Bangkok area to see if they could possibly take care of Apple. It turned out that the elderly couple lived on a meager income cutting bamboo and could not afford housing, living instead outdoors in the open in various fields using plastic sheets for shelter. Those were not safe living conditions for Apple.

As the grandparents gave credible assurances that they wanted to take care of Apple responsibly and lovingly, H2H officials worked with state social workers to find an accommodation solution where the three could live together. A room was rented for the grandparents. They were provided with basic food and received a small amount of money for their medical care. It was soon evident that the grandparents were quite able to cope and live together with Apple thanks to the improved living conditions. However, it would be some time before she could live with them on a regular basis, as trust had to be built up over time first. On small trips and other occasions, all three got to know and like each other.



To this day, H2H helps Apple live with her grandparents by providing funds for food, rent, and schooling, so that she doesn’t need to live in an orphanage – this is the charity’s stated aim.

Today, Apple attends the second grade and can benefit from H2H’s support until she graduates from high school.

"BACK TO LIFE"

CES Waldorf, Bogotá, Colombia

Primavera becomes a major supporter of the large-scale food donation campaign in 2020

People were gripped by fear, uncertainty, and a sense of helplessness as the Covid-19 pandemic began to unfold in March 2020. In the Sierra Morena and Ciudad Bolívar districts in southern Bogotá, too, families felt powerless. The city's administration imposed strict directives that meant families and children had to go into lockdown and socially distance.

In response, the staff of the CES Waldorf aid project began to look for ways and means of remaining in constant contact with the families and children in their care.

And the project had actually started into 2020 with so much enthusiasm and confidence after Primavera had taken the first steps toward introducing education in the fields of trauma and emergency response. However, these had to be put on hold again as lockdown measures were imposed.

At the same time, the aid project received more and more messages from desperate parents and single mothers who could no longer go to work, had no income, were short on food, and whose children were struggling under the isolation.

Of the families supported by the project, 90 percent became destitute within a short period of time. In addition, many people who worked in low-skilled and low-paid jobs suddenly found themselves unemployed and unable to pay rent on their tiny accommodations.

From mid-March last year, schools, universities, and public administration offices were closed and on



March 17 the government declared a nationwide state of economic emergency. This was also followed by a strict curfew for the elderly.

In desperation, some people set out and knocked on doors wherever they could asking for help and food. Faced with this situation, the project team made the decision to bring all food and reserves they had directly to CES Waldorf for distribution.

At the same time, the donations provided by Primavera for the planned training measures for young people were unceremoniously reallocated to food procurement. That is how the extraordinary food donation campaign Back to Life was born. The first food packages went to those families already in a critical condition and suffering from malnutrition.

The organization that handled the whole initiative inspired confidence all around and encouraged more families to approach Primavera, express their solidarity, donate, and also helped prevent raids and attacks on the food transports.

The generosity of more than 4,000 donors (Waldorf schools, sponsors of CES Waldorf children, individuals, Bosch associates, and Primavera) made it possible over nine months to support the families we care for in the CES Children's Village as well as to provide food for another 5,000 families.

By December of last year, a total of 20,000 food parcels had been distributed, thus providing critical help to people in need.



WHEN THE SPARK CATCHES ON

Engels, Russia

Committed Bosch associates have been successfully implementing Primavera projects for five years.

Following the example of Primavera, associates in Bosch's largest company site in Russia, in the city of Engels on the banks of the Volga founded the VESNA aid project in spring 2016. The initiator at that time was Vladyslav Razladov, who was seconded from Bosch Germany to Engels, Russia, where he took on the position of commercial plant manager of Bosch Automotive Aftermarket. He soon instilled in the organization the idea of "helping children in need" at the Engels site and very quickly found like-minded people committed to the mission: helping children in need to improve their opportunities for a better future. He would later say: "The spark immediately caught on."

But first, various bureaucratic hurdles had to be overcome, and the rules for NGOs had to be observed. This also applied to the naming of the new organization, which had to be in Russian. That is why the Primavera aid project in Russia is now called VESNA, which is Russian for "spring". After almost eight months, the work was done and the organization was officially recognized and registered. It was then possible to start providing support in selected charitable institutions, such as kindergartens and schools.

The first pilot projects were a kindergarten and a school for children with disabilities (Down's syndrome). With the money donated by Primavera, rooms were renovated and made nicer, and furniture and toys were purchased. The aim was to encourage the development of the children in everyday play and learning situations and to improve their living situation.

Two other mixed schools with children with autistic and other minor disabilities or orphans from the surrounding area received support with special educational programs to make everyday life easier.

In Engels Children's Clinical Hospital, where sick and severely ill children are supported in their treatment and rehabilitation, VESNA helps by providing special medical equipment and much more. In all initiatives, the emphasis is always on ensuring that children, some of whom come from poor families, receive the medical care they need in order to get well again.

Maria Olejnik has been supporting Primavera's activities from the beginning and says: "We get a lot of positive feedback." Following Vladyslav's return to Germany, Maria has officially

taken over the responsibility for and coordination of the core team and says the spirit is deeply ingrained in the team. And: "We are not running out of ideas for what to do next."

This year's summer camp for children of poor families and orphans is an initiative especially close to the heart of Maria Olejnik and the team. Bright-eyed, she says: "By providing learning tents and sports equipment, we are not only giving the children a great, care-free holiday season, but also helping to make up some of the learning deficits that have resulted in a difficult school year on account of the pandemic."

In the meantime, VESNA is making a name for itself beyond the Bosch factory gates, with associates at all three plants in Engels and even at the head office of the regional organization in Moscow familiar with the projects and willing to contribute with generous donations.

But most impressive and valuable is the unwavering commitment of the many associates and their active support in the projects on site.

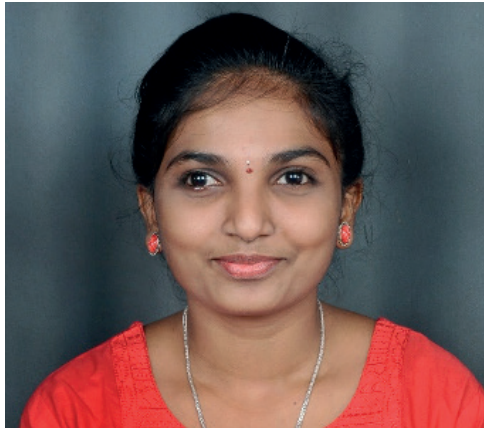
REMARKABLE LIVES

For more than 30 years, Primavera e.V. has been working for the education and training of children and young people in emerging countries, in order to offer them sustainable prospects for a self-reliant life later on. The following stories of two young women from India are examples of what is possible.

SRGVVK Trust Charitable School, Bengaluru, India

Founded in 1991, the school was accredited with Edu-GIRLS in 2016. It is housed on a farmstead on which the founding couple also live and which accommodates school classes up to seventh grade. After that, students are placed in private schools through Edu, where they receive further support in the form of scholarships. The school currently cares for 255 pupils in need from socially and economically disadvantaged families, providing tuition, uniforms, books, and lunches free of charge.

Sowmya did not have an easy childhood. Like many families in India, her parents did not have enough money to provide their children with a good education.

School attendance – which might sound like a basic right to us – is unfortunately a privilege in India. Thanks to SRGVVK Trust, Sowmya has managed to escape poverty. She herself describes the institution as her safety net, her support, and, in turn, as the most important milestone in her life.

Her schooling began in a daycare center. The teachers were very helpful, motivating, and taught her not only the official school syllabus but also the life morals and ethics that made her the person she is today.

Thanks to the project's outstanding work, Sowmya was able to successfully obtain her diploma in electronics and communications and later get a high-level job in a company with ties to Japan.

Today, she even speaks a little Japanese and occasionally represents the company on business trips to Japan. Thanks to the numerous Primavera donations, the Trust was able to support her and accompany her on her journey to achieve her personal goals and make her dreams come true, which is unfortunately still by no means a given for a girl in India.

Sowmya is deeply grateful to the teachers, donors, and the entire Trust and says: *"You are the sculptors of my life; you have made me a content and successful person."*

Deepa Academy for the Differently Abled boarding school for visually impaired girls, Bangalore, India

Established in 2006 with the aim of educating and empowering visually impaired girls, Deepa Academy has so far taken in more than 200 girls in Bangalore, provided them with an education, and empowered them to lead independent and self-reliant lives.

Gulab Sha was born blind in a remote village in the state of Karnataka. She was accepted by the Academy and learned the art of Indian classical dance there. She traveled throughout India and the United States to present her dance performances and was thus allowed to experience the appreciation of thousands of art lovers.

Later, she would successfully complete her schooling and graduated with a bachelor's degree in art. Her ability to read and write Braille, as well as her excellent English skills, made it

possible for her to receive computer training using reading software. She completed her college education with excellent grades and went on to get a job in the Civil Court of Mysore, which she enjoys a lot and requires a high level of responsibility.

Gulab Sha recently got married and lives with her husband in Mysore. Her parents are very proud that their little girl is able to live a happy and independent life today despite her disability. She remains a member of Deepa Academy to this day and an inspiration to all the students.
